Envisioning Information By Edward R. Tufte

Revered as the designer's bible by some, *Envisioning Information* explores the conundrum of designing visual information from 3 or more dimensions to 2 dimensional print media. The 120 page book is chalk-full of examples laid out on comprehensive, easy to read pages. Tufte takes the reader through maps and diagrams of the world, before and after the content is redesigned. The reader is able to clearly identify the rules of good design.
